Morocco, alongside Algeria, forms the demographic backbone of the Arab Maghreb Union, with their combined population exceeding 60 million – three-quarters of the entire union. Remarkably, nearly 3.3 million Moroccans now reside abroad, a threefold increase over the past 15 years<sup>8</sup>

This "Moroccan diaspora" is experiencing a fascinating geographical shift. While traditionally concentrated in the European Union – predominantly France (1.6 million) and Spain (700,000) – recent trends reveal a diversification of destinations. This broadening reflects complex push-and-pull factors, encompassing changing economic



opportunities, evolving demographics, and individual aspirations<sup>9</sup>.

Understanding the pervasiveness of Moroccan migration necessitates examining multiple facets:

## **Drivers of Emigration:**

- Economic disparities: Moroccans, particularly young adults, often seek better livelihood opportunities abroad due to limited domestic options.
- Demographic pressures: Morocco's growing population puts strain on resources, further mendorong individuals to migrate in search of stability.
- Social networks: Established communities of Moroccans abroad can facilitate migration through social support and information sharing.

- Attracting MRE (Moroccans Résidant à l'étranger) investment: Creating an environment conducive to investment by Moroccans living abroad can attract

valuable capital and expertise back into the domestic economy.

However, these strategies need to be implemented within the broader context of international economic uncertainty. Continuous monitoring of the evolving situation and proactive adaptation will be essential for effectively mitigating the potential downside risks.

This initial resilience of North African economies in the face of the global crisis offers a glimmer of hope. However, complacency would be a dangerous misstep. By acknowledging the potential challenges ahead and implementing well-crafted strategies, the region can weather the storm and emerge stronger, laying the foundation for a more resilient and diversified future.

While the recent global crisis prompted Morocco to launch a public campaign wooing its diaspora for investment, their efforts extend far beyond this single initiative. Recognizing the multifaceted value of its emigrant communities, the government employs a strategic mix of direct and indirect engagement strategies<sup>12</sup>.

One intriguing example is the "Canal Atlas" program, a fixture on national television for four years. More than mere entertainment, this show serves as a bridge between Morocco and its diaspora, focusing on "migrant-development." It educates and empowers MREs by providing:



- Investment guidance: Detailed information on potential projects, locations, and government incentives equips viewers with the knowledge to confidently invest in their homeland.
- Connection to opportunities: By showcasing diverse investment possibilities, the program ignites entrepreneurial spirit and facilitates informed decision-making.

Foster national pride: Highlighting successful diaspora contributions fosters a sense of shared purpose and encourages participation in the nation's growth.

Canal Atlas exemplifies Morocco's understanding that remittances. while crucial, represent only one facet of the diaspora's potential. By nurturing knowledge, aspirations, and a sense of belonging, the government cultivates a fertile ground for deeper engagement and mutually beneficial partnerships.

### However, challenges remain:

- Bridging the information gap: Ensuring consistent and accessible information dissemination across diverse diaspora communities is crucial for maximizing program reach and impact.
- Tailoring the message: Different segments of the diaspora may have varying aspirations and needs. Diversifying program content

The allure of a better life abroad holds a powerful grip on young minds, especially in countries facing economic challenges. In Morocco, television programs specifically targeting young viewers raise concerns about their potential to fuel irregular migration to Europe.

A recent survey by Sadiqi found a striking statistic: over half of young Moroccans (55.5%) believe their own media, particularly TV channels, encourage irregular migration. This perception stems from the portrayal of successful Moroccan emigrants (MREs) and an "idealistic image of a wealthy Europe." .<sup>13</sup>

But is this perception reality? Does media coverage truly act as a siren song, luring

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young people towards perilous journeys in search of an elusive dream?

Understanding this complex issue requires examining both sides of the coin:

## **Fueling Aspirations:**

• Success stories: Showcasing MREs who have prospered abroad can ignite aspirations and entrepreneurial spirit in young viewers. However, the risk lies in presenting these narratives as representative of all migration experiences, neglecting the hardships and challenges faced by many.

**European allure:** Emphasizing the perceived wealth and opportunities in Europe can create an inaccurate and romanticized image, potentially overlooking the realities of integration and everyday life in these countries.

## **Distorting Reality:**

- Selective portrayal: Focusing solely on success stories without acknowledging the struggles and failures of irregular migration can paint an incomplete and misleading picture.
- Economic anxieties: Young people grappling with unemployment and limited opportunities at home may perceive irregular migration as the only escape route, further amplified by media portrayals that downplay the risks and difficulties.

- Media **responsibility:** Diversifying content to include narratives of struggle alongside success, emphasizing the risks and challenges irregular of migration, and presenting balanced portrayals of life in Europe are crucial steps.
- Addressing root causes: Tackling youth unemployment, improving economic opportunities, and fostering a sense of hope and agency within Morocco are essential long-term solutions.
- **Open dialogue:** Encouraging open and honest discussions about migration, its complexities, and alternatives can empower young people to make informed decisions.

III.1Algeria: The Government efforts face illegal immigration according to El Chourouk in Arabic and El Watan in French:

The phenomenon "Harragas", of Algerian youth attempting perilous journeys across the Mediterranean, has catapulted irregular migration onto the national stage, demanding attention from both civil society and the government. This dramatic shift marks a departure from the previous media landscape, where migration coverage primarily focused on statistics and sub-Saharan migrants.

Prior to 2019, news reports largely addressed sub-Saharan migrants crossing Algerian borders, detailing arrest figures and legal statuses. Algeria's established refugee population, including Sahrawi refugees from the Western Sahara conflict and Palestinian refugees, received some coverage, but rarely dominated headlines. Sub-Saharan asylum seekers and "economic migrants", estimated at 1,600 and 20,000 respectively, remained largely the periphery of media in narratives .14

However, the emergence of the Harragas phenomenon transformed the media landscape. Since the first reported attempt in 2019, the issue has become a "burning" one, attracting hundreds of articles, analyses, criticisms, and denunciations across public and private media outlets. This shift highlights several key points:

 Shifting public anxieties: The rise of the Harragas phenomenon reflects broader public anxieties about economic prospects, youth disenfranchisement, and potential instability. Media coverage amplifies these concerns, fueling national discourse.

Evolution of the narrative: From solely focusing on external migration (sub-Saharan migrants), the media spotlight has turned inward, confronting the domestic realities driving irregular migration among Algerian youth.

 Increased scrutiny: The sheer volume of media coverage indicates heightened public and governmental interest, potentially paving the way for policy changes and support mechanisms to address the root causes of irregular migration.
