The first article, titled "*Entendre ces silences : traduire, transmettre et refléter Entendez-vous dans les montagnes... de Maïssa Bey, en italien et en anglais,*" delves into the analysis of Italian and English translations of Maïssa Bey's novel. It highlights the complex interplay between languages and cultures, examining the translation choices made by Barbara Sommovigo and Erin Lamm. The article offers captivating insights into the nuances of conveying the multiplicity of themes and languages in the original text, presenting a dialogue between the author and the translators.

Moving on, the second article, "*L'écriture comme métaphore de la traduction dans le champ littéraire algérien,*" takes us into the realm of Algerian literary creation, where writing itself becomes a metaphor for translation. Focusing on the works of Mohammed Dib, the author explores the intricate relationship between writing and translation in the Algerian literary field. He provides a deeper understanding of the role of translation in shaping the poetics, symbolism, and ideology of Maghrebian literature, drawing from specific texts and theoretical perspectives.

Transitioning to the field of technical terminology, the third article, "*Le rôle du lexique transdisciplinaire dans la constitution des terminologies techniques: le cas de l'industrie de la plasturgie,*" investigates the role of transdisciplinary vocabulary in the formation of technical terminology, with a focus on the plastic industry. Through statistical measures and in-depth analysis, the authors provide a comprehensive classification and comparison of disciplinary and transdisciplinary vocabulary, revealing the crucial role of transdisciplinary lexicon in technical translation.

The fourth article, "*Traduire les cultures: quelles stratégies pour traduire l'intraduisible au sein des œuvres littéraires africaines?*" delves into the intriguing challenge of translating untranslatable terms in African literary works. The author explores the plurality of African works that blend native and Western languages, resulting in terms that defy straightforward translation. This article offers valuable insights into the strategies employed by translators in navigating the complexities of translating cultures while preserving their richness.

Next, the fifth article, "*Jacques Derrida et Souleymane Bachir Diagne : La Traduction comme trahison,*" explores the philosophical perspectives of Jacques Derrida and Souleymane Bachir Diagne on translation as betrayal. Challenging traditional notions of accuracy and fidelity, the author delves into the deconstructive nature of translation, celebrating plurality and fostering dialogue between cultures. This article draws on African anthropology and linguistic

analysis, inviting readers to contemplate the transformative power of translation in transcending boundaries.

The sixth article, "Du translingue comme post-monolinguisme: Subvertir le maternali(ngui)sme dominant pour légitimer la minorité spanglish," explores the concept of translanguaging as a post-monolingual phenomenon, focusing on the case of the Spanglish minority in Puerto Rico. The author examines the development of a new linguistic code resulting from prolonged contact between English and Spanish. This research sheds light on the discursive and linguistic strategies employed by the Puerto Rican writer Giannina Braschi to legitimize Spanglish, providing insights into the dynamics of linguistic hybridity and its role in shaping identities.

In the seventh article, titled "Identidad nacional en Blacksad mediante la cultura marítima: análisis sobre las influencias del Atlántico y el Mediterráneo," the exploration focuses on national identity in the comic series Blacksad through maritime culture. The author analyzes the influences of the Atlantic and the Mediterranean on the narrative and themes of this work, which blends American hard-boiled fiction and European noir-criminal genre. This analysis offers new insights into the interplay between different cultures and their impact on the genre. Shifting our focus to the field of linguistic engineering, the eighth article, titled "¡Un clásico que nunca falla! Ingeniería lingüística y degustación: la invención como estrategia psicosociodinámica en el trinomio alemán-inglés-español (DE-EN-ES)," explores the role of linguistic engineering in the airline industry's menu cards. The authors analyze menu cards from Lufthansa, Air Canada, and Iberia, examining the strategies employed to persuade and tempt passengers into making specific food choices. This research highlights the deliberate use of linguistic techniques to enhance the customer experience and improve communication and customer satisfaction.

The ninth article, titled "Quelle méthode de traduction des métaphores de l'espagnol vers les langues camerounaises en contexte d'apprentissage?" addresses the challenges of translating metaphors from Spanish to Cameroonian languages in a learning context. The authors qualitatively analyze the translation of metaphors by students from a translation institute in Cameroon, highlighting the difficulties in translating cultural connotations and acrolectal styles. The article recommends specific methodological approaches to enhance the effectiveness of translating metaphors and underlines the importance of incorporating metaphoric translation methods in translation training programs.

The tenth article, titled "The Translator-Author: Explaining the Literary Translation Process through Creativity," explores the concept of creativity in literary translation. The author delves into the transformative dimension of translation, emphasizing that it involves ingenuity and intuition beyond mere word reproduction. Drawing insights from sociology, psychology, and philosophy, this article highlights the role of creativity in producing original and impactful translations.

In the eleventh article, titled "La traducción al español de las pasivas y adverbios franceses en «Un chant écarlate», de Mariama Bâ," the focus is on the Spanish translation of French passives and adverbs in Mariama Bâ's novel, "Un chant écarlate." The author provides a Spanish translation of selected passages from the novel and analyzes the challenges encountered in translating these morphosyntactic elements. The article also includes a brief survey of Senegalese literature, particularly feminist literature, to provide a contextual background for the analysis.

*The twelfth article, "Metaphors Are Missing: Critique of Arabic Translation Strategies of Gendered Metaphors," examines the translation strategies employed by Arab translators when translating gendered metaphors from English into Arabic. The article highlights the challenges faced in preserving the unconventional images created by female writers that challenge gender stereotypes and relations in the target culture. It suggests the need for new approaches and strategies to convey the purpose and meaning of these metaphors in a different cultural context.*

*Shifting our focus to linguistic analysis, the thirteenth article, "L'activité phatique et régulatrice dans la conversation en fulfulde-funangeere: aspects interactionnels et relationnels," explores phatic and feedback activity in conversations in Fulfulde-Funangeere. The article analyzes the linguistic materials used by participants in informal conversations to establish and maintain communicative contact and mark the addressee's commitment. Through sociolinguistic surveys and analysis of conversational data, the article sheds light on the interactional and relational functions of phatic and feedback activities in the Fulfulde-Funangeere language spoken in Maroua, Cameroon.*

*Moving on to the fourteenth article, titled "Investigating Translation Strategies of Lyrics: A Case Study of English and French Versions of the Song Unstoppable by Sia and Sara'h," the author examines the translation strategies used in translating Sia's lyrics into French. Using Levefere's strategies of poetry translation and Baker's strategies for non-equivalence at the word level, the study analyzes the translation of selected lyrics to determine suitable strategies for lyrics translation and provide new interpretations for the translated lyrics. The findings emphasize the importance of maintaining the original meter and rhythm in song translation.*

*The fifteenth article, "Le traducteur face à la variation: quelques problèmes théoriques et méthodologiques," explores the challenges faced by translators when dealing with novels strongly influenced by the context of production. The article focuses on the aesthetic orientations of novelists from former French colonies in sub-Saharan Africa and examines issues related to translation, including transposition, transfer, and the search for the genesis of meaning. It suggests a cooperative approach, along with indicators for decoding, to address the challenges presented by non-re-expressible terms in translation.*

*Shifting to audiovisual translation, the sixteenth article, titled "Rendering Taboos in Subtitling and Dubbing: A Case Study of the Persian Translation of the American Drama Television Series the Big Little Lies," discusses the challenges faced by Iranian translators in translating taboo words in the subtitling and dubbing of American TV series. The study examines the strategies used by Iranian translators to find suitable equivalents for taboo words and analyzes the frequencies and percentages of the applied strategies. The findings highlight the use of substitution and euphemism as the main strategies employed by Iranian translators.*

*The seventeenth article, titled: "De la notion de corpus dans les études contrastives en langues: choix, outils et exploitation" focuses on the concept of "corpus" in linguistics, particularly in contrastive linguistics. The authors use a Taxonomy approach from Natural Sciences to define corpus-related terms, describe various types of corpora, and highlight tools for creating specialized corpora for contrastive linguistic studies. The article equips young scholars in this field with the necessary skills for effective corpus selection, construction, and exploitation.*

*The eighteenth article, "Modèle et Assignation pour une désambiguïisation du lexique" deals with sentence and phrase ambiguities, proposing models and assignments as solutions. The study involves a French-to-Baoulé translation of 100 sentences, highlighting the challenges of communication when faced with interpreting ambiguous sentences. The article explores disambiguation through syntactic and semantic angles using templates and assignments.*

*The nineteenth article, "Syllable Isochrony in Selected Nigerian Hip-Hops: Implication for Nigerian English Pedagogy" examines rhythmic patterns in Nigerian Hip-hop and their potential impact on Nigerian English pedagogy. The study analyzes songs by Nigerian artists and investigates whether Hip-hop can be used as an alternative medium for teaching English rhythm in Nigerian schools. The findings reveal divergences in rhythm patterns, leaning towards syllable-timing rather than stress-timing, which may pose challenges in using it for teaching rhythm in schools.*

*The contributions in this issue unfold new prospects in the domain of translation and languages studies and reveal the diversity characterizing different cultural settings and its bearing on understanding, interpretation and communication when translation acts take place.*
